WeGOJA Foundation and SCAAHC launch South Carolina Family Reunion Toolkit

Columbia -- With support from the <u>WeGOJA Foundation</u>, the South Carolina African American Heritage Commission launched the South Carolina Family Reunion Toolkit today at <u>www.FamilyReunionSC.com</u>. The website encourages planners to reconnect with family and rediscover heritage by incorporating visits to African American historic sites in their next reunion.

On the site, browsers will find suggestions for <u>destinations</u> in which to host their next reunion, and state and local <u>parks</u> in which to host family picnics. They'll also find <u>sample day-trip itineraries</u> to dozens of sites outlined in the <u>GreenBookofSC.com</u> – hidden gems, districts and markers that interpret compelling stories about African Americans in the Palmetto State.

"We believe families are always seeking new and unique ways to host this special weekend every year," said Dawn Dawson-House, executive director of the WeGOJA Foundation, which supports SCAAHC projects. "The toolkit is a one-stop shop of ideas, suggestions and references to help planners build an exceptional and enriching experience for their next get-together."

The toolkit also suggests ways to establish a reunion steering committee, build an itinerary and personalize the reunion.

Family reunions are distinctive aspects of African American culture. They are rooted in the Emancipation era of the mid 19th century when formerly enslaved people placed "Information Wanted" advertisements in newspapers in search of family who were separated under the cruel practice of slavery.

By the turn of the 20th century, family reunions became more joyful gatherings. African Americans who fled the Jim Crow South for better education and job opportunities created the nation's first African American middle class. With their discretionary income, they traveled back down South to reunite with family they left behind. And they used the Negro Motorist Green Book to identify welcoming establishments on their journey.
