WeGOJA Makes Two Hires to Develop Preservation Toolkit

May 22, 2023 – Columbia, SC – The <u>WeGOJA Foundation</u> has hired a project leader and administrator to develop a Preservation Toolkit for cultural nonprofits after receiving a major grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

Hired as project leader is Kate Borchard Schoen, a public historian with significant experience with the

South Carolina State Park Service and the Pauli Murray Center for History and Social Justice in Durham, NC. Schoen will be responsible for the overall development and delivery of the Preservation Toolkit, ensuring the primary components of public outreach and engagement, content development, and website launch are achieved within the two-year timeline provided by the \$750,000 Mellon Foundation grant.

Hired as administrator is Timika M. Wilson, a retired Lieutenant Colonel with the U.S. Army whose military career included project management with the Corps of Engineers. Wilson will be responsible for logistics, accountability, and reporting.

Both were leaders in the <u>Union County Community Remembrance Project</u> that memorialized the under-told story of lynching victims of the late 19th century. Their volunteer work generated interest in and strengthened collaboration around cultural preservation and awareness of African American history in the Upstate community.

When it is complete in 2025, the Preservation Toolkit will serve as a onestop shop for resources for property owners, advocates, community leaders and others to help them meet their cultural and historical preservation goals. For more information on the project, click here.
